



Public Disclosure:
Hannibal-LaGrange University status changed
from “Accredited” to “Accredited – On Probation”
Effective: November 3, 2022

The Higher Learning Commission has placed Hannibal-LaGrange University in Hannibal, Missouri, on Probation. HLC took this action because it determined that the institution is out of compliance with HLC requirements.

The initial period of Probation is not more than two years. Probation affords an institution a reasonable period to address HLC’s concerns. While on Probation, the institution remains accredited, and it has the opportunity to remedy the issues that led to the sanction.

What This Means for Students

In most cases, other colleges and universities will continue to accept the institution’s credits in transfer or for admission to a higher degree program. All colleges and universities define their own transfer and admission policies. Students interested in pursuing a higher degree or transferring should contact the college or university they plan to attend so that they are knowledgeable about the admission and transfer policies for that college or university.

Noted HLC Requirements

HLC concluded that the institution does not meet the following HLC requirements:

- Criterion Two, Core Component 2.C, “Sufficient Board Autonomy”
- Criterion Five, Core Component 5.B, “Resource Base”
- Assumed Practice D.3, “Future Financial Projections”

HLC concluded that the institution meets with concerns the following HLC requirements:

Criterion Three, Core Component 3.C, “Sufficiency of Faculty and Staff”

Next Steps

The institution is required to provide evidence that it has addressed the issues that led to the sanction, no later February 1, 2024, in preparation for HLC’s on-site evaluation no later than April 2024. In October/November 2024, the HLC Board of Trustees will determine whether the institution has demonstrated that it is in compliance with HLC requirements and whether Probation can be removed.
